THE SKILLS TO PROBLEM SOLVING

(Inspired by Illustrative Math)

1

RECOGNITION

Recognize the problem exists.
Understand when the problem started. Document what factors created the problem

2

COLLABORATION

When necessary, let others know of the issue. Bring in help - Who can bring or share the skills for the problem? Always consider who can contribute other perspectives.

3

APPLICATION

When you have the skills and collaborators, apply the tasks for a solution. Many tools can also help with applying work to the solution efficiently.

4

SOLUTION

Document the results with how you discovered the problem. Document the tools and attribute your collaborators. Keep those skills in your toolbox – you'll need them again!


Problem Solving

Practicing the "productive struggle" is necessary to problem solving, learning collaboration, and finding confidence in your work.

If you want to learn a new skill, start by trying something new or hard. Allow yourself to experience the productive struggle of researching, asking questions, collaborating, and refining your work.

In math, the correct answer is supported by knowing all of the incorrect answers. The more problems we encounter, the closer we are to reaching the solution.

So, if you ever find yourself facing a problem, use your problem solving skills!



How to talk about problem solving

In meetings: be present, support others' ideas, share thoughts

With teammates: discover the answer together, build trust, knowledge sharing
